## **President's Letter**

Summer is here and there's no better place to ride than in Michigan! Hope you've been enjoying the sunny, warmer days on your bike(s). KBC's club rides are 'rolling' along with good turnouts and an increasing number of ride groups. Thank you to the Ride Committee and all active KBC's Ride Leaders who make the time to ensure the rides are safe and enjoyable for everyone!

### **501(c)(3) Update**

We received some wonderful news mid-May from the IRS. KBC's application for the tax exempt 501(c)(3) status was approved by the IRS. In addition, KBC is a Michigan Registered Charity. Many thanks to Mike Boersma, Doug Kirk, John Olbrot, Valerie Litznerski, and the folks at SeberTans for their hard work making this happen. It really takes a team of members with an end goal in sight to accomplish something this significant, this will be a wonderful thing for KBC.

So, what does this mean for KBC members? First of all, donors to the KBC can deduct contributions made on or after April 2, 2018, including KBC memberships, Bike Camp registrations, KalTour registrations and other donations via the "Donate" button in the Menu bar on the KBC website. KBC members should contact their tax professional for more information on donations. Having 501(c)(3) status also allows the KBC to save money by not having to pay state sales tax and by getting a break from PayPal on credit card processing.

Like anything new, there is still more for us to learn about this status. If there are any KBC members who have experience with the 501(c)(3) status and processes, we could use your help navigating it all. If you're willing to help, please email Mike Boersma (KBC's Treasurer) or myself. Thank you!

### **Welcome Bike Campers**

A warm KBC welcome to all the Bike Campers who joined us this year. We hope that through Bike Camp we rubbed a little bit of our passion for cycling off on you. Also, thank you to all the dedicated KBC members and bike shops who volunteered or donated items for Bike Camp. This event is only made possible with your support and KBC greatly appreciates it!

### **LMB Advocacy Day**

On Wednesday, May 23<sup>rd</sup> John Olbrot, Pam Sotherland, Thom Brennan and myself ventured to Lansing, MI to participate in the League of Michigan Bicyclists (LMB) Lucinda Means Bicycle Advocacy Day. This event provided the opportunity for all road cyclists and trail users to speak with one voice to help make Michigan

bicycling better. We met with local State Representatives and State Senators to discuss bicycling related legislative priorities and thank them for supporting these bills.

## KalTour 2018 -- Getting Close

*Plans & preparations* --- Sunday June 24 is not far away. On that day KBC will hold its 27th annual summer tour, KalTour 2018. Some aspects of KalTour 2018 such as the choice of distances to ride and plenty to eat at sag and lunch stops will be familiar while others will be new and different.

*New start location & new routes* --- The biggest changes for KalTour 2018 are a new starting location and new routes. KalTour 2018 will start and finish at Schoolcraft High School, located at the intersections of 14th Street and Lyons Street (VW Avenue) in Schoolcraft. Overall, the shorter routes will be relatively flat compared to previous years. Furthermore, the new starting location will allow riders immediate access to quiet back roads. The **15 mile route** will stop at Prairie View Park before returning to the school grounds for lunch. The **31 mile route** will travel to Scotts Mill Park for lunch midway through the ride. The **62 mile route** will visit Scotts Mill for refreshments and then loop around before returning for lunch. The **100 mile route** will stop at Scotts Mill for refreshments, Markin Glen Park for lunch, and the State Fish Hatchery for a final refreshment stop.

*Route maps available on Ride with GPS* --- Maps for all four routes are available on the KBC Club Account at Ride with GPS (<https://ridewithgps.com/clubs/1837-kalamazoo-bicycle-club>), and links to those routes can be found on the KalTour page of the KBC website. You can also find the routes by searching "KalTour 2018" in the KBC route library or by going to the KBC Event Calendar for June 24 at the Ride with GPS site <https://ridewithgps.com/organizations/1837-kalamazoo-bicycle-club/events>.

*Register online* --- Online registration from the KBC website will remain open through Friday June 22. (See <http://www.kalamazoobicycleclub.org/events/kaltour/> to register.) KBC members will receive a \$5 discount by signing into their KBC member account before registering. Furthermore, there are no additional or third party charges for online registration! You can still register and pay on Sunday, but the cost will be higher and there will not be a member discount.

*Volunteer* --- Road painting will take place on Thursday evening June 14. Meet at Schoolcraft High School at 6 pm. Supplies and maps will, of course, be provided. Even in the age of GPS, accurate and well-placed painted and color-coded arrows are important to riders. Also important to riders are efficient handling of the formalities of rider check-in as well as food service at lunch and sag stops. All of these services to riders will take people -  
- KBC members who are willing to spend at least part of KalTour day helping other riders. Please let me know if you (or a spouse or other family member) can help!

## **Kudos**

Kudos to middle school gym teacher John Dunlop and the Portage Schools for training some 700 middle schoolers on how to safely ride bikes! Mr. Dunlop used a grant from Specialized bicycles to purchase 50 mountain bikes and helmets for teaching a well-structured program during Central Middle School's gym class. The syllabus included basic skills training as well as ride etiquette. If all goes well the program may expand into other Portage middle schools. One of the key obstacles to teaching bicycling skills in a public school is finding a way to fit such education into an already jam-packed curriculum. To my knowledge, this is the largest program of its kind in our area and suggests many possibilities. The program grant included funds for a local bike shop (Pedal) to assemble and maintain the bikes. - Submitted by **Paul Selden**

Thanks to Silent Observer of Kalamazoo County for continuing to remind the public about their special fund for reporting tips that might help solve serious crimes against bicyclists. Thanks also to the anonymous donors who have helped the fund to grow to more than six times its original size since it was first established in 2017. The fund has reached \$3,100 according to County Prosecutor Jeff Getting, a Silent Observer Board Member, as confirmed by Janine Dales of the Kalamazoo County Sheriff's Department - Submitted by Paul Selden

Huge appreciation goes to the leadership at three of the areas' largest law enforcement departments: the Kalamazoo County Sheriff's Department, the City of Portage Department of Public Safety, and the City of Kalamazoo Department of Public Safety for their role in a special selective enforcement effort of traffic laws related to bicycling, during Kalamazoo Bike Week. Sheriff RIchard Fuller, Director Nick Arnold (Portage) and Chief Karianne Thomas (Kalamazoo) collaborated in that public safety effort, that should make it easier to underscore the bike and motorist road safety reminders during and after KBC's Bike Camp. - Submitted by Paul Selden

## 19<sup>th</sup> Annual W Ride Report

April 2018 will not go down in the annals of KBC riding history as a month with the most stellar of cycling weather. But at least it wasn't snowing, as the Ride Leader drove to Vicksburg High School on the morning of Saturday, April 28 for the 19<sup>th</sup> Annual W Ride.

However, it was rather cold (42 degrees) and possibly the windiest that it has ever been at a W Ride. So, after handing out spaghetti W Ride maps, the RL left the parking lot towards Calhoun County with only 5 other riders; Tom Reichert with his brother-in-law Matt, Terry O'Connor, Herman Evenboer, and Tom Cross.

The RL pulled and wrestled with his bike for a couple miles, thanks to the strong crosswind with a very slight tailwind. Tom Cross then took over the pulling duties and the riders soon separated into 3 groups as they hit the rolling hills between 36<sup>th</sup> Street and Fulton; The three Ts, followed by the RL (leading only himself), followed by Herman and Matt. The riders regrouped in Fulton and rode the Calhoun County line together where they stopped for a brief break, savoring the Calhoun County scenery. At the point, the riders were averaging 15.3 mph.

Soon after starting the ride back to Vicksburg, they again broke into smaller groups; the lead group consisting of Tom C. and Herman. West of Fulton, the number of W Riders increased to seven, as Dan, a friend of Tom R. and Matt, joined the ride, having ridden from his home in Schoolcraft. The riders regrouped at the high school; their average dropping slightly to 15.2 mph. Matt (due to lack of riding mileage), Terry (due to the cold), and Tom C. (due to bicycle mechanical issues) decided to end their W Ride experience, but the other 4 riders continued westward, after a brief stop at the Shell station. By then, the temperature had risen to 46 degrees and the wind was still windy.

Herman and the RL did most of the pulling to Schoolcraft, where Dan ended his own W Ride experience. Herman and RL then continued to do most of the pulling until they reached Van Buren County, still averaging a cumulative 15.2 mph.

After another brief break, this time to savor the Van Buren County scenery, the 3 remaining riders headed back to the high school. Thanks to a wind that had finally shifted into a crosswind/tailwind, Tom R. took the lead and soon the RL watched numbers on his cyclometer increase from 19 to 21 mph with occasional bursts of 22 mph enthusiasm. At Schoolcraft, the RL took the lead and knocked the pace down to 19 mph, then with two miles to go, Tom R. took back the pacemaking duties and opened a small gap on the other two riders, which they finally closed inside the Vicksburg village limits. At the end of the ride, the cumulative pace had risen to 15.9 mph.

Tom R., Herman, and the RL enjoyed a post-ride snack of delightful mini-pretzels, washed down with either orange, fruit punch, blue cherry, or fierce(?) grape Gatorade in the by now balmy 48° temperature before heading back to their homes. And let the record state that the RL did not celebrate the completion of another successful W Ride by mowing his lawn.

### Notes from Special KBC Meeting at Boatyard Brewing on May 8, 2018

After Welcome and Introductions, **President Renee Mitchell** Brian, Dan, and Diane for hosting us at Boatyard Brewing. She also thanked **Robin Sides** and **Val Litznerski**, for organizing this event.

Renee congratulated **Paul Wells** for writing another successful proposal for a grant from DALMAC to support efforts of the Education Committee.

Bike Camp's 14<sup>th</sup> year started in the first week of May for 60 participants, the maximum that can be accommodated in our program. We are hoping that Bike Campers will be supported through the rest of the riding season with no-drop rides at our regularly scheduled Monday Night Rides. Please get in touch with **Terry Butcher** if you are available to help lead a no-drop ride.

- KalTour – Sunday, June 24<sup>th</sup> – will start at a new location, Schoolcraft High School. **Mike Krischer** assures us we will have great weather.
- Meeting of Bicycle Friendly Kalamazoo to plan 2019 Bike Week - June 28<sup>th</sup>

The Michigan Blind Athletic Organization, which has an athletic camp at WMU's BTR Campus is looking for additional volunteers to act as captains for the student-athletes. If you have a tandem to bring, that would also be greatly appreciated.

**John Olbrot, Vice President** conducted Ride Leader sanctioning at the end of the meeting.

The focus of our special meeting was brief presentations by several guest speakers from local organizations that support and promote bicycling in the Kalamazoo area.

The first guest speaker was Toni Daniels, President of TriKats. Toni spoke about her background as a cyclist, and how it grew from an activity to increase fitness to a passion that led her to compete in longer and more challenging triathlons. Over past few years, Toni has sought opportunities to collaborate with other local clubs to enhance experiences of participants in group runs and group rides rather than to duplicate the different club's efforts, splitting the athletic community up into smaller groups during training. Toni also touched on some of the dangers cyclists encountered when riding on the road with drivers. While she is certainly very concerned and dedicated to promoting a safer community, on a personal level she understands that she can't avoid all risk or let it limit her enjoyment of riding, running, and swimming.

Erin Denay, from Open Roads, spoke second. Goals of Open Roads are to teach bike repair and maintenance, along with social skills and life skills for youth development, to economically disadvantaged children at risk of academic failure. There are several programs to support and mentor kids including Earn-a-Bike, a 6-week program, and the paid youth advisory board. Open Roads staff work closely with local agencies to identify at-risk youth who could benefit from their programs. Erin shared some stories about individuals who have made positive life changes with support from Open Roads.

Tim Krone represented Pedal Bike shop, an active supporter of the cycling community. Started about seven years ago, Pedal focused initially two underserved groups - women and higher education students - while also supporting competitive cyclists. As the business grew and evolved, Pedal shifted to focus more on making cycling "fun." Pedal understands that they are one of many local bike shops and that selling and servicing bicycles is a competitive market. Tim noted that Pedal recently applied for and received a Gold-level Bicycle Friendly Business award from the League of American Bicyclists. In closing, Tim highlighted several events available for local cyclists that are both competitive and fun, including cyclocross and many gravel races.

Donna Whitcomb represented AMBUCS organizations in Kalamazoo (<http://www.kvambucs.org>), an annual recipient of half of the proceeds from KBC's KalTour. A motto of the organization is "shoulders together" to level the playing field for folks who want to ride a bike. AMBUCS is a service organization that also provides therapeutic tricycles to those who are unable to ride a traditional bike, and it provides scholarships to therapists. On their website you will see an array of bikes for everyone from toddlers to adults. Donna thanked the individual club members who have made donations to offset the costs of bikes and scholarships provided by AMBUCS.

Ryan Barber spoke about the Kzoo Swift bicycle shop in Kalamazoo. He shared the story about events in his life, working a few odd jobs and slowly becoming more involved in refurbishing and selling bike parts, that led to his

opening Kzoo Swift. Over time he rented a retail space and hired staff to assist with the expanded services that he offered. Though he now sells new bikes, Kzoo Swift continues to focus on serving riders who might not be able to afford a brand new high-end bike by selling refurbished bicycles. He and his staff endeavors to provide better service and selection than can be found in national department chain stores.

David and Mary Jo Warwick, co-chairs of Kalamazoo Bike Week, spoke about the origin and current events of Bike Week. Started seven years ago, in response to the Kalamazoo Parks Foundation desire to bring attention to the KRVT, Bike Week events quickly expanded to encompass the greater cycling community. Currently, Bike Week is a celebration of cycling and endeavors to increase awareness of cycling. Bike Week also educates cyclists and motorists on how to help make cycling safer. Bike Week events appeal to a wide audience of cyclists, and the community support for Bike Week has been wonderful.

**Committee Reports** submitted after the meeting.

**Mike Boersma, Treasurer**, reported these figures for the three KBC accounts: Checking account \$3608.19; CD \$6173.02; Paypal \$5816.73. The Checking account includes \$560 in Jeremy Smith funds and \$718.76 remaining in DALMAC grant funds.

Income and expenditures for the 2017 DALMAC grant are as follows: \$3000 (Initial DALMAC Grant); \$961.87 (KBC match via donations, a 32% match on the grant to date); \$3243.11 in expenses (5' passing signs and magnets); \$718.76 remaining. Note: Additional matching funds from Boatyard 5' Passing Ale and from collection jars at local bike shops are forthcoming.

As of the May meeting, KBC had not yet received a determination from the IRS on its 501(c)(3) application. KBC applied to the State of Michigan to be a registered charity.

**Dale Abbott, Communications Director:** This is a very busy time of year for KBC promotions and communications. The following activities have been promoted via email blasts, website blurbs, press releases, Facebook boosted posts, and inclusion on other websites: Bike Camp, KalTour, Bicycling Diversity Night, Boatyard/KBC Community Ride, Club Rides, and Bike Week. There was also an official Club Response to the Picket Verdict via a press release, Facebook Post and Press Release

Dale and Val discussed a plan for KBC's Facebook presence and decided the best course of action would be to:

1. merge the "Give Them Five" page into the general KBC page
2. re-name the KBC page from "Kalamazoo Bicycle Club presenting as KalTour" to simply "Kalamazoo Bicycle Club"
3. re-name the KBC Group to something other than "Kalamazoo Bicycle Club" so as not to be confused with the page.

These changes will be implemented after KalTour because we are using the general and group pages frequently for promotion right now.
